Location: Bonanza, Oregon Project Dates: August 8 - 19, 2016

Thank you for your interest in the Bonanza Seventh-day Adventist Church project, one of our many efforts based in North America. Each year, Maranatha works with organizations in the United States and Canada to provide volunteer labor for various construction or renovation projects. Typically, these North America projects provide lodging and meals to participants.

Project Overview

In 2013, Maranatha volunteers worked in Bonanza to construct the first phase of the congregation's building project. They built a fellowship hall that has served as a meeting room and outreach building, as well as a sanctuary. In the meantime, the congregation has continued fundraising for their church. Now, volunteers will return to Bonanza to construct the sanctuary. The new structure will seat approximately 100 people.

Volunteers will help with the wood framing and siding, as well as window installation and rough electrical and plumbing work.

Accommodations

A small number of volunteers will stay in church member homes or in church classrooms. Please plan on bringing your own bedding. There are also at least 12 RV sites with full hookups available for those wishing to bring their RV. Local housing will be very limited, so if you can bring an RV or camper, we would greatly appreciate it.

Expenses

The only costs to volunteers are the travel expenses to and from Bonanza. Three meals a day, accident insurance, and local housing are free in exchange for your volunteer labor.

Attractions

Volunteers may choose to arrive early or leave a few days after the project concludes to appreciate local sights and activities. Feel free to make your own arrangements for some of these or other popular area attractions.

Crater Lake | Located only about an hour and twenty minutes from Bonanza, this pristine mountain lake in an old crater has beautiful views from the crater rim and hiking trails, as well as water access, for those who enjoy swimming, boating, and fishing.

Rogue River | The Rogue River winds through much of southern Oregon, and Hellsgate Jetboat Excursions is one company that offers jet boat tours up the canyon. This fully narrated trip zooms up the river on large passenger boats and provides gorgeous views of the scenery. There are chances to see deer, river otter, bald eagles, and more! This is considered THE excursion in the area. Tours are run out of Grants Pass, Oregon, about two hours and twenty minutes from Bonanza.

Weather

In August, temperatures average from low to high 80's, but can dip into the 40's at night. So be prepared for all types of weather, and be sure to bring a light jacket. Of course, current weather conditions can change at any time, so we recommend that you check the 10-day forecast before leaving to ensure that you are prepared for the most current weather conditions in Bonanza.

Safety

Maranatha has a very high safety record on the worksite. This is, in part, because we require everyone on the construction site to wear a hard hat and gloves at all times. Please also wear appropriate safety equipment for the work tasks and wear sturdy shoes. Exercise caution while working on the construction site and be careful when working on or around ladders or scaffolding.

AIG World Wide Insurance Coverage

All volunteers will be covered by accident insurance from the time they arrive at the project until their departure. This is a secondary policy, which means all claims will first be processed through your primary policy.

This secondary policy does not have a deductible for medical charges; however, it does carry a \$250 per occurrence deductible for dental charges.

Maximum Benefits:

Accidental death or dismemberment \$75,000

Medical/dental expenses \$100,000

Medical evacuation \$250,000

Repatriation (in the event of a death) \$25,000

Purchasing Maranatha Insurance

Maranatha mission projects are construction projects where people can get hurt. Accident insurance is essential. It is not possible for Maranatha to analyze everyone's policy to see whether his or her insurance is current and the coverage is in effect at the location of the mission project. The Maranatha Board of Directors decided that the safest route was to require everyone to purchase the secondary coverage that we carry. The cost of this coverage is provided free of charge to Maranatha volunteers on North American Projects.
