Project Overview

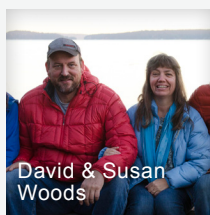
Camp Lawroweld was originally constructed as "North Woods Maine Camp" for the boys of Yale University. Built around 1900, this post and beam lodge has one of the largest stone fireplaces in the state of Maine. The camp is situated on beautiful Lake Weld, a natural glacial lake surrounded by mountains.

Volunteers on this project will help with renovations to the lodge, including wood paneling, flooring, and finishing. A remodel of the girl's bathhouse is also needed.

Accommodations

There is space for 60 volunteers on this project. Volunteers who request housing will stay in the camp lodge. There are also 8 RV sites with full hookups available for those wishing to bring their RV. If housing is limited, priority will be given to volunteers who can participate the entire length of the project.

Expenses

The only costs to volunteers are the travel expenses to and from Camp Lawroweld. Three vegetarian meals a day, accident insurance, and housing are provided by the camp in exchange for your volunteer services.

Allergies and Dietary Restrictions

The camp will be providing the meals each day. We ask for your allergies on your registration form, and we will do our best to accommodate your needs. However, we cannot meet all special requests. If your diet is restrictive (vegan, gluten-free, etc.) we recommend that you bring items such as soy milk powder, gluten-free bread, etc. to supplement the meals provided by the cooks.

About Weld, Maine

Attractions

Weld is a small town set beside Webb Lake and almost surrounded by mountains and therefore is noted for its scenic beauty. There are a few sights in Weld that may be of interest: Height of Land Scenic View, Blue Moose Farm, Small Falls Rest Area (byways.org), Coos Canyon, Acadian Seaplanes, Mount Blue Trail, Wilhelm Reich Museum, Mount Blue State Park Campground.

Weld is also about 85 miles from Acadia National Park-Bar Harbor, Portland Head Lighthouse, and other sites in Portland, Maine.

Volunteers may choose to arrive early or leave a few days after the project concludes in order to appreciate local sights and activities. Volunteers are responsible for making their own arrangements, including food and lodging, for all days outside of the project dates.

Weather

Average temperatures for late September and early October average in the low 60's to low 30's Fahrenheit but plan for just about any type of weather. They do average about 10 days of rain during the month of October so you may want to bring a warm jacket, just in case. Of course, current weather conditions can change at any time, so we recommend that you check the 10-day forecast before leaving to ensure that you are prepared for the most current weather conditions in Weld, Maine.

Travel Information

Flights

Once you have registered and been confirmed, if you are flying to the project, please plan to travel within these guidelines:

Arrival | Please plan to arrive in Portland International Jetport (airport code PWM) before 6 pm on September 27.

Departure | Please plan to depart from Portland International Jetport (airport code PWM) after 12 pm on October 9.

This is a 90 minute drive from/to the camp. Please book flights that come in before 6 p.m. on the arrival date. If you need to fly in later, or outside the project dates, please check with the Maranatha office to confirm that your arrival time can be accommodated.

If you will be leaving before the project end date, please be aware that you may be responsible for arranging your own transportation back to the airport. Please send your itinerary to volunteer@maranatha.org so pick up arrangements can be made.

AIG Insurance Coverage

Maranatha mission projects are construction projects where people can get hurt. It is not possible for Maranatha to analyze everyone's insurance policy to see whether his or her insurance is current and the coverage is in effect at the location of the project. The Maranatha Board of Directors decided that the safest route was to require everyone to be covered by the insurance coverage through Maranatha's carrier. For projects taking place in North America, the cost of this is covered by the hosting organization.

All volunteers will be covered by this insurance policy from the time they depart for the project until they return home. For volunteers who have extended travel by arriving before or staying after a project, the insurance would start and end on the Maranatha project dates based on the project application.

Insurance coverage depends on location of the project and home residency of the volunteer. Both policies are primary policies that do not have a deductible. As with all insurances, exclusions apply. An insurance brochure with the policy information and list of benefits will be sent to you in the confirmation email for this project.

Safety

Maranatha has a very high safety record on the worksite. This is, in part, because we require everyone on the construction site to wear a hard hat and gloves at all times. Please also wear appropriate safety equipment for the work tasks and wear sturdy shoes. Exercise caution while working on the construction site and be careful when working on or around ladders or scaffolding.
