#### **Pre-video Discussion Questions**

- What did you have to do to prepare for that trip?
- Have you ever had a chance to build something? What was it? How did you feel when you finished building it?

#### **Post-video Discussion Questions**

- What kind of people went on the very first Maranatha mission trip more than 50 years ago? (Families)
- What do you think would be your favorite part of serving on a mission trip?

- If you decided to go on a mission trip, what would you need to do to get ready? (Passport, fundraising, flights, etc.)

- Ask kids what they would add to the prayer list

### **Did You Know?**

- On Maranatha mission trips, volunteers almost always sleep in a clean room with electricity and running water. Meals are prepared by a Maranatha-trained cook.
- Maranatha has at least two Family Projects a year—one during the summer and another during Christmas.
